How to Make Corncob People



Corncob Growing on a Corn Stalk

Materials

Cob without seeds Cloth for wrapping around cob Yarn or string to tie on the cloth Glue Corn silk for hair

Making the Corncob Person

Remove the outer husk and silk. Save the silk. Remove the seeds. Clean and dry the cob. Draw a face on the cob or draw a face on a strip of fabric and glue it to the cob. Glue the corn silk to the top of the cob. Wrap the cob in cloth and tie the cloth with yarn or string.



Some children or grownups dressed the corncobs in cornhusk clothing.

Boys and girls who wanted loggers or farmers for their play people dressed the corncobs in scraps of fabric that looked like work clothes. They added corn silk beards.
